Interview Verification Form	- Competitors will conduct an interview with a Respiratory Therapist and ask questions to help them learn more about the career. Assistance with locating a Respiratory Care program, if needed can be found HERE. - Competitors and interviewees can discuss and determine an appropriate length and format of the interview (in-person, via Zoom, via telephone, etc). - The Interview Verification Form will be uploaded to the HOSA Digital Upload System. - The Interview Verification Form will NOT be pre-judged. Instead, event staff will check the list of those who have uploaded to the HOSA Digital Upload System for compliance. - Failure to upload the Interview Verification Form to the HOSA Digital Upload System by the deadline will result in a 15-point deduction taken in Tabulations.

REQUIRED DIGITAL UPLOAD: Interview Verification Form

Required Digital Upload	- The following item(s) MUST be uploaded to the HOSA Digital Upload System by May 15: - Interview Verification Form – as ONE PDF file. If the upload is not submitted as a single PDF document, the judge will NOT view it and NO points will be awarded. In addition, any links or documents that are not accessible to the judge for viewing, no points will be awarded. May 15 at midnight EST is the final deadline and there will be NO EXCEPTIONS to receipt of the required materials after the deadline. - Detailed instructions for uploading materials can be found at: https://hosa.org/competitive-event-digital-uploads/ - State Leadership Conference (SLC) vs. HOSA's International Leadership Conference (ILC) State Leadership Conferences. The competitor must check with their Local Advisor for all state-level processes used for competition, as digital uploads may or may not be required. International Leadership Conference. - If a competitor uses the HOSA Digital Upload System as a requirement at the SLC, the competitor MUST upload an ADDITIONAL time for ILC by May 15. - If the HOSA Digital Upload System is NOT used at the competitor's SLC, it is still the competitor's responsibility to upload the interview verification form for HOSA's ILC no later than May 15. Not using the HOSA Digital Upload System at a competitor's State Leadership Conference is not an exception to the rule. - The FINAL ILC digital upload deadline is May 15. We STRONGLY suggest not waiting until the last minute to upload online to avoid user challenges with the system.

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Presentation to Judges

1. Presentation Content: The **five (5) minute presentation** for the judges will include:
 - a. Who they interviewed and when
 - b. Demand and Occupational Outlook: Research the need for RTs and why now is the time to consider this career path <https://moreerts.com/growing-need/> or <https://www.bls.gov/ooh/healthcare/respiratory-therapists.htm>
 - c. Educational pathways and requirements: Outline the education needed to become an RT and opportunities for professional growth through advanced degrees and specialty credentialing <https://be-an-rt.org/find-your-path/>
 - d. Overview of the profession: Explain the benefits and challenges of being an RT, the various healthcare environments RTs serve, and their role on these healthcare teams
 - e. The Why - The Story of the Respiratory Therapy Interviewee and why they chose this career path
 - f. Is respiratory therapy right for me?
2. Competitors may use a battery-operated, personal electronic device to show a visual aid of their choosing to judges during the presentation, such as Prezi, PowerPoint, Bulb, etc.
 - a. The competitors must speak during the presentation and only use the visual aid to enhance the message they are trying to convey. In other words, competitors should not simply record something ahead of time and push “play” – the presentation should be live for the judges.
3. Competitors should present the content creatively to capture the judges’ attention and share what they learned about Respiratory Therapy.
4. The content can be organized and presented in any manner the competitor wishes- the most compelling and unique ways of sharing the content will be most successful.
5. Competitors shall report to the interview site at the given appointment time with any premade presentation aid to support their presentation.
6. Competitors will NOT have access to electricity. A personal electronic device (such as a laptop) is permitted. Internet connection is NOT provided but can be used if provided by the competitor via a Wi-Fi hotspot or other source.
7. The use of notecards is optional during the presentation. Notecards can be paper or electronic (on a tablet, smartphone, laptop, etc). If using electronic notes, this device must be different from the device they are using to show judges presentation materials, as the notecards may not be shown to judges.
8. A timecard will be shown when one (1) minute remains. The competitor will be stopped after five (5) minutes.

Final Scoring

In the event of a tie, a tiebreaker will be determined by the areas of the rating sheet section(s) with the highest point value in descending order.
