This competitive event consists of two rounds. Round One is a written, multiple-choice test, and the top-scoring competitors will advance to Round Two for the skills assessment. This event aims to inspire members to learn more about the field of veterinary care.

ROUND TWO- Skills Assessment

1. The top competitors from Round One will advance to Round Two. The number of advancing competitors will be determined by the scores obtained in Round One and the space and time available for Round Two. Round Two finalists will be announced on-site at ILC per the conference agenda.

2. Round Two is a selected skill(s) assessment. The skills approved for this event are:

Skill I: Identification of Companion Animal Breeds/Species (see list of dog and cat breeds that could be identified below)	8 minutes
Skill II: Wound Care for Abrasions (on either DOG or CAT)	7 minutes
Skill III: Pad Wound Care (on either DOG or CAT)	7 minutes
Skill IV: Tick Removal (on either DOG or CAT)	7 minutes

3. For all skills, body fluids will be a simulated product and live animals will not be used.

Below is the list of dog breeds used for the **Skill I: Identification of Companion Animal Breeds/Species**. This skill may be administered with the Round One written test. If this skill is administered with the Round One test, the skill assessment allotted time (8 minutes) will be added to the test time (60 minutes) to equal 68 minutes.

4. The selected skill(s) will be presented to competitors as a written scenario at the beginning of the round. The scenario will be the same for each competitor. A sample scenario can be found here . Some scenarios may involve the combination of multiple skills. In the event rating sheets are combined it is not necessary to repeat a task a second time. An example would be competitors would not need to identify the patient twice.
5. Timing will begin when the scenario is presented to the competitors and will be stopped at the end of the time allowed. The scenario is a secret topic. Competitors MAY NOT discuss or reveal the secret topic until after the event has concluded or will face penalties per the GRRs .
6. Judges will provide information to competitors as directed by the rating sheets. Competitors may ask questions of the judges while performing skills if the questions relate to the patient's condition and will be included in the scenarios or judge script.
7. Competitors must complete all skill steps listed in the guidelines, even if the steps must be simulated/verbalized. (If the equipment is available, the competitors would complete all skill steps as the scenario warrants. The competitors will simulate/verbalize the steps if the equipment is unavailable.)
8. Competitors must use all equipment correctly and safely. Judges will stop a student and not award points for a step if they see a competitor is about to cause a risk of harm or about to damage equipment or other supplies.

Final Scoring

1. The competitor must earn a score of 70% or higher on the combined skill(s) in the Round Two-Skill Assessment (excluding the test and animal breeds) in order to be recognized as an award winner at the ILC.
2. The final rank is determined by adding the round one test score plus the round two skill score. In the event of a tie, the highest test score will be used to determine the final placement.

6.	Bandaged the foot by placing a strip of adhesive tape on each side of the foot, starting several inches above the wound and extending several inches past the bottom of the foot. (Tape directly on fur). <i>The tape will act like stirrups to hold the bandage in place.</i>	2 0

8.	Wrapped the paw with a gauze roll, starting from the toes and ending just above the ankle or wrist.	2 0
